CITY OF MILFORD REGULAR MEETING OCTOBER 5, 2021 MINUTES

A regular meeting of the Mayor and Council of the City of Milford, Nebraska was held at the City Hall Building in said City on the 5th day of October 2021 at 7.00 pm. Present were: Mayor Patrick Kelley; Council members: Tony DeLong, Kelli Keib, Becky Freeman, Mike Roth; Attorney Anthony Aerts; Maintenance Supt. Gary TeSelle and City Clerk Jeanne Hoggins. Also present: Andrew Willis with Cline Williams, Zane Francescato with SCCDP, Deb Lytle, Misty Ahmic and Police Officer Jon Weidemeyer. Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by publishing in the Milford Times; a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Affidavit of Publication attached to these minutes. Notice of the meeting was given to the mayor and all members of the Council and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to the Mayor and Council of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the public.

CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Kelley called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. and publicly stated to all in attendance that a current copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act is available for review and is posted on the west wall in the City Hall meeting room.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

APPROVE AGENDA AS SUBMITTED: A motion was made by Freeman and seconded by Keib to approve the agenda as submitted. Roll call vote: Freeman yes, Keib yes, DeLong yes, Roth yes. Motion carried.

REPORTS/COMMUNICATIONS: Written reports received: Fire Dept. report for September 2021; Police Dept. Activity Report for August 2021; Milford Mailer Newsletter for October 2021; Library report from September 2021; Milford Aging Services Commission minutes from August 17, 2021 and September 21, 2021. Seward/Saline Solid Waste Management Agency minutes from June 17, 2021 and September 16, 2021. NPPD Retail Briefing information for 2021. Work Order Activity Report from Maintenance Supt. Gary TeSelle for September 2021.

Keib – Cemetery: repairs still needed on fence. Pool: Median seeding project will be completed this week. Met with Jonathan Jank and Gage from SCCDP holding discussion on services linked to health and wellness in Milford. Discussion held of a possible "Snack Shack" at the pool or vending machines to generate income for projects such as a climbing wall and footbridge in the pool. Sidewalk issue in town is something of concern knowing children need a safe way to navigate the streets to school and activities. Update on information and availability of programs to come. SSCSWMA met September 16, 2021. Status of Inter-Local Agreement was checked. Tipping fees were discussed, no decision was made to increase. Waiting for debit to credit ratio report and copy of the original agreement to make an informed decision. Reimbursement percentage will be re-evaluated in January. Still have 1 trailer and a few plastic bins at the dump. Bee and Milford have both picked one up. Any trailers or bins left after 10/31/21 will be recycled at the Landfills discretion. Next meeting scheduled for January 20th at 7:00 pm.

Roth – Fire Dept.: 25 total rescue calls for September, no fire calls. Water/Sewer: Continue to test water for quality report. Surveying will begin for the first 3 phases of the water

main replacement project. 1st, 2nd and 3rd Streets will be flagged. Residents will be notified by ad in Milford Times, Facebook and information included in water bills. A special meeting with NDEE may be scheduled to discuss the lead and copper rule.

Mayor Kelley continues to work with Dave Henke, JEO and Tony on the Park renovation and splash pad. Working with Gary TeSelle on TCD regarding streets and the punch list items.

Freeman – Sr. Center continues to add classes. The elevator needs to be replaced, made application to Aging Partners for funding. Classes are being held on the main level as the elevator is not reliable. Meals and meal counts are going well.

DeLong – <u>Parks</u> - Working with Mayor Kelley and Dave Henke from JEO on the plans for the park renovation. This will be a nice upgrade to the city. Discussing fund raising efforts to replenish community betterment fund. <u>Streets</u> – getting patching projects on the books. Pursuing speed tables along D Street to control speed. There are a lot of kids utilizing D Street. The average speed down D Street is 25 MPH which is monitored by the new speed sign. Alley projects and tree trimming are underway.

Zane Francescato reported on <u>Rural Workforce Housing</u> as they approved their first application for funding in Milford. Developer is working with the contractor. Approx. \$400,000 toward project. A second application has been received.

Mayor Kelley praised the maintenance crew on the great job they did this month. (Trees, potholes, grass) TeSelle reported they will be tarring streets soon. Asked the public to avoid the area as men are working.

Clerk Hoggins -*Sales tax received for the month of July 2021 in the amount of \$20,249.16. NPPD lease payment for the month of August 2021 in the amount of \$25,022.09. Thank you from Dave Henke with JEO.

CURRENT BUSINESS:

Discussion of proposed redevelopment project at 1100 1st Street and proposed Extremely Blighted designation: Andrew Willis with Cline Williams educated the council on the new legislation regarding the "Extreme" Blight and Substandard designation. The TIF project in the original Blight & Substandard area allows for 15-years. In March of 2021 legislation passed if an area is designated "Extremely" Blight & Substandard the financing can be extended to 20 years. There are 2 qualifications to be met before an area can be designated as extremely blighted. The average rate of unemployment in the area must be 200% of the State average and the average poverty rate in the area has to exceed 20%. Looking at the census track for Milford, 1.3% unemployment vs the States 3.3%, (not nearly over 200%) poverty rate is 4.7%, not nearly 20%. The difference of cost in the proposed project is around \$30,000.00. Andrew asked if this is something the city is interested in. He's not sure if we will even qualify.

Mayor Kelley noted, based on the numbers presented we're not even close anyways. Not sure why we would want to keep that conversation going as a possibility. Probably not worth looking into. Mr. Willis noted he will tell the developer that the city will stick with the typical Blight & Substandard area as it exists, 15 years. Mayor Kelley suggested he add that looking at the numbers the city did not feel like it was worth moving forward based off the numbers. The Council thanked Andrew for attending.

Consider ban on Pit Bulls to be amended to only include full Pit Bulls and not cross breeds. Mayor Kelley shared that Debbie Lytle had submitted a request form to place this on the Council agenda. Her request states: I would like the ban on pit bulls to be amended to only include full pit bulls and not cross breeds.

Mayor Kelley announced he will give everyone the opportunity to speak and present information allowing each person 3 minutes of floor time.

<u>Debbie Lytle</u>, 420 4th St., 8 years, Church Parsonage: Identify pit bull breed worksheet by photo. (Attached) Animal may be misidentified. Temperament test done on dogs, Pit bulls second to Labrador Retriever as being least aggressive. (Attached) Debbie did research thru the National K-9 Research Council. She does not own a dog but has family members that own pit bulls and she loves them. She is sad that they are judged by the way they look. Factors in dog bite related injuries: Dogs that are kept as a resident dog opposed to dogs being kept in a kennel, chained up or live in kennels for breeding are more aggressive than

dogs living in the household which are socialized with families. Dogs that have not been spayed or neutered cannot control urges, true with all breeds. Owners that neglect or abuse their dogs.

Debbie stated that her original request was to amend the ordinance only to include full bred pit bulls. After her research of what other communities do, there is a Breed Ambassador Requirement in which the dog would need to pass a K-9 good citizenship test. This test can be done at the National Humane Society or the American Kennel Club. Petco in Lincoln will test the dog in a number of different situations. If the dog does not pass the test, they will conduct training in order to be certified as a K-9 good citizen. Proof of sterilization and rabies vaccination prior to licensing. Make it a requirement that the owner submit their dog to this test proving the dog is not aggressive.

The main thing is that we are all on the same page. We want our community to be safe, work together for that goal. A lot of it is the pet owner not the pet and it is terrible to punish an animal or good pet owner.

Brandon Morin, 515 Fairway Dr. #10, Rent, 2.5 years: Debbie is absolutely right, we want our community to be as safe as possible. With that in mind, he doesn't believe that the reduction of breed specific legislation is going to be conducive to that point. There is a lot of statistical evidence and studies that have been done showing breed specific legislation is not as effective as legislation that is more specific to how owners handle their dog and how the dog is handled after is may have been considered a dangerous animal. Brandon presented a comprehensive list of all the legislation specific to ownership. Documentation titled "The Fiscal Impact and Breeds Discriminatory Legislation" was provided to the board. A copy of an email sent from Senior Legislative Attorney for Best Friends Animal Ethnicity Group was also provided to the mayor. Brandon pointed out the contact information if the council had any questions regarding writing laws. Brandon wanted to bring to the councils attention the potential for violation of due process. Fines accessed other than a written citation where you can go to court and present information. Last point, the responsibility to prove that the dog is without a reasonable doubt an American pit bull terrier would be on the municipality. This has been held up in court City of Pierre vs Lockland.

Jill Severino, 209 S. Hwy 6 #3, Rent, 2.5 years: Provided bite record information, the PSI force in which different breeds bite. Doberman Pincher – PSI 600, English Mastiff 556, Rottweiler 328, Pit Bull 235. Pit bulls do not have nearly as much jaw power as some of the breeds that are welcome in this town. Not as likely to get bit by a Pit Bull as you are a dog with a higher PSI. The problem with going breed specific is you can't exactly prove what breed it is. There is no national database for dog bites, the CDC stopped collecting data back in 1998 due to identifying breeds. Dog breeds are misidentified 50 to 87% of the time. It would be a good idea to branch out and hold the owners accountable, not the dogs. Jill asked the council to read the 14 page document regarding owner responsibility.

<u>Leah Policky</u>, 302 N. F St., Own, 30 years: Presented 2020 fatality statistics and 72% were caused by pit bulls. It speaks for itself. Young children and people of all ages walk the streets in Milford – "Is it worth the risk?" Fatalities are extremely dangerous when a Pit bulls clamps down and they don't let go.

Robert Engel, 305 1st St., Own, 21 years: Trains Germain Shepherds 32 years. He walks thru town with his dog on a leash and his dog gets attacked by small dogs. Small dogs are uncontrolled. He did have an incident in 2004 where one of his dogs grabbed Rod Hoppe's grand-daughter. He has never been attacked by a pit bull. It's not the breed, it's the person. Gary TeSelle, 909 4th St., Own, 57 years: Gary watched his cocker spaniel get drug off his front porch by a pit bull. If Gary would not have taken immediate measures, it would've

killed his cocker spaniel. The owner, which was walking the dog with a large chain, was not strong enough to hold onto the pit bull. He agrees the owners should be held responsible.

<u>Debbie Lytle</u> – wanted to close by asking the council to amend the ordinance, adding an exemption of the Good Citizenship Training allowing dogs of all breeds to be permitted in the community.

<u>Keib</u> has been on both sides. Her daughter was attacked by a dog. She has been around dogs all her life. She is not crazy about the breed specific ordinance. The owner should be held responsible and expected to follow specific guidelines.

<u>Roth</u> noted the small sector of individuals that showed up to the meeting. He would like to talk to more community members.

<u>Freeman</u> would like to read thru the information presented, giving it a fair chance from what was said. Most of the group present represents people that want pit bulls, very few people are here to speak on the other side. It's fair to give both sides an opportunity to say something.

<u>DeLong</u> is a numbers guy, he noted there are a lot of bad stats. He would like to talk to more people in the community. He liked the comment about holding the owner responsible. Tony would like to table this, talk to more of the community, look into the information/statistics to make an educated decision.

A motion was made by DeLong and seconded by Roth to table the request to alter the ordinance. Roll call vote: DeLong yes, Roth yes, Freeman yes, Keib yes. Motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT: A motion was made by Freeman and seconded by DeLong to adjourn the meeting. Roll call vote: Freeman yes, DeLong yes, Keib yes, Roth yes. Motion carried and meeting adjourned at 8:11 pm.
