CITY OF MILFORD REGULAR MEETING SEPTEMBER 5, 2023 MINUTES

A regular meeting of the Mayor and Council of the City of Milford, Nebraska was held at the City Hall Building in said City on the 5th day of September 2023 at 7:00 pm. Present were Mayor Patrick Kelley; Council members: Tony DeLong, Becky Freeman, Kelli Keib, Mike Roth; Attorney Anthony Aerts; Chief of Police Darrin Kremer, Maintenance Supt. Gary TeSelle and City Clerk Jeanne Hoggins. Also present: Susie Huber, Ethel and Arden Svoboda, Misty Ahmic, Robert Struwe, Jonathan Jank, Matt Howe and Emily Hemphill with the press.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by publishing in the Milford Times a designated method for giving notice, as shown by the Affidavit of Publication attached to these minutes. Notice of the meeting was given to the mayor and all members of the Council and a copy of their acknowledgement of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to the Mayor and Council of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the public.

CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Kelley called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. and publicly stated to all in attendance that a current copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act is available for review and is posted on the west wall in the City Hall meeting room.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

REPORTS/COMMUNICATIONS: Written reports received: Police Dept. Activity Report for August 2023; Milford Housing Authority minutes for July 12, 2023; Milford Aging Services Commission minutes for August 15, 2023; Pool Board minutes from August 16, 2023 and August 30, 2023; Recreation Board minutes from August 21, 2023; Fire and Rescue report for August 2023; Library Report for August 2023; Milford Mailer Newsletter for September 2023. SCCDP Quarterly Report Summary thru August 2023.

Keib – SSCSWMA-Next meeting is September 28th, 7pm, at Milford City Hall. Cemetery-Chuck Wergin is done mowing at the Cemetery for the season. City Maintenance will mow again if needed. After the unfortunate loss of Bill Lauber, and the resignation of a couple of other members, the Cemetery Board was down to one person. Thanks to local residents answering to serve it has been repopulated. We appreciate the service of the above mentioned and look forward to the new ideas and energy of those appointed tonight. Senior Center- Discussion was had about who can implement activities, it was agreed better communication needs to be had between the Board and Senior Center members concerning activities. Meal rates have been raised to \$7 for 60 and up and \$8.00 for under 60. Sharon Bender and Ethel Svoboda attended the Pool Board meeting to work towards allowing the seniors to utilize the community pool after season for Water Aerobics Classes. That will be discussed later in the agenda. A By-laws committee has been formed and will be present at the September meeting. The dishwasher needed repair, that was performed in early August. Mystii is working diligently on Social Services Aged and Disabled provider approval to help off-set meal costs. Daily congregate and delivered meals are going well.

NDEE Inspection had some violations that are being addressed and easy fixes with the order of some thermometers, chlorine test strips, and facial hairnets. Yoga is going well, and additional classes may be upcoming. Kathy will be starting a Tai Chi class on Tuesday mornings at 10am. Aging partners visited on August 11th, that info will be available at a later date.

Roth – Rescue calls: 16 Medical. Fire calls: 5-2 false alarms, 2 trash fires, 1 gas line strike. The water main project is going well, a construction meeting was held last week and everyone seems to be on the same page. The State is going to pick up the cost on a crossing at 5^{th} & F Street. Sewer – had general cleaning done and will be back for root treatment.

Freeman – Recreation Board has met and discussed fundraising event which went well. Funds have been donated towards 2 new scoreboards; recreation fund will cover the balance with the fundraising efforts. Pool has been drained, winterized all but outside restrooms. Lifeguards have been partially reimbursed for the season. Updates will be made to the Pool Manual prior to next year's season.

DeLong – The Hwy 6 project is out for bid. <u>Patching Project</u> – 8th & D and 1st and F Intersections near completion. <u>Parks</u> – Sprinklers are in, sod is ordered and waiting to be installed sometime this week. Will be adding a 2nd camera for security. Additional tree trimming will take place with water main project. Removing any trees with issues. Gary has someone lined up to provide ideas for landscaping on the B Street medians.

PUBLIC HEARING: To hear testimony in favor of, or opposition to, and to answer questions in relation to request for a Class K Catering License, VS Investments Inc. dba Sheri's Grill & Bar, 503 1st Street.

Mayor Kelley opened the Public Hearing at 7:10 pm. Robert Struwe noted the State of NE allows 6 per year and they have 9-10 scheduled already. The license is under Sheri's Grill & Bar but they are in the process of changing the dba to Uptown Tavern. With no further questions or comments from the board or public, Mayor Kelley closed the public hearing at 7:12 pm.

CURRENT BUSINESS:

Consider Class K Catering License for VS Investments Inc. dba Sheri's Grill & Bar, 503 1st Street. A motion was made by Roth and seconded by Keib to approve the Class K Catering License for VS Investments Inc @ 503 1st Street. Roll call vote: Roth yes, Keib yes, DeLong yes, Freeman yes. Motion carried.

Request for Agenda Item: Ethel Svoboda, Question and comments regarding August 1st agenda item (e) Consider extending swimming aerobics at pool beyond the season. Ethel Svoboda thanked the Mayor and Council for allowing her to speak at the meeting. She noted positive attributes to the water aerobics class; good cardio workout, easier on

the joints/body, socializing and creating friendships. It is sponsored by the Sr. Center but is open to anyone.

Some of the reasons not to extend the class which were noted from last month's meeting: Cost – no real answer given.

Pending Certified Pool Operator – Asked Councilmember Keib if she received any pay last season? She replied, No, I did not.

Ethel noted she was a town board member and she knows the city does not make any money running a pool. Why do we do it? It provides a service to the community of all ages. Place to go and cool off, take lessons, group parties, exercise and socialization. Also provides employment for managers and lifeguards in the community.

Pool Staff were unable to clean the pool at the end of the year, which led to issues of it not being clean when the pool season started. Councilmember Freeman noted the pool house was a disaster and they didn't have time to clean it before opening day. Ethel noticed this year that majority of the cleaning was done by an employee and not pool staff. The pool is closed for 9 months she thought some cleaning could be accomplished in that time frame. Pool Board discussed the issue and it was decided that they would not stay open as long as last year. The understanding of the pool board was that there was no interest in extending the season. She did not think anyone checked with the water aerobics instructor. The Pool Board also discussed meeting the required pool regulations which were not noted in their approved minutes.

Ethel directed a comment to Mayor Kelley: She felt he was very unprofessional and bullying in his comments to Councilmember Keib. She felt he owed her an apology.

Mayor Kelley responded: Regarding the question about Councilmember Keib receiving payment as a Pool Operator. She was not authorized to obtain a Pool Operator License and the city reimbursed her for the Pool Op Cert. She was not at the budget meeting when the pool budget was discussed to address these specific comments regarding pool operation cost. She was tasked as liaison over the pool the past couple years and in that time frame the cost continued to rise. When previous councilmembers were over the pool, cost was decreased.

Extending the pool season for a group of individuals where the compensation received is relatively low, required factors to be analyzed. Mayor Kelley wished he had researched those statistics prior to last month's meeting. He apologized for not having those available. He is not against keeping the pool open longer for a group of individuals, but his job is to make sure that the city is being good fiscal stewards of public dollars. He understands the importance of aerobics and has had a vision of a community center in Milford since coming on as a council member. After visiting with Gary and researching expenses, it appears the cost to extend the pool season is relatively low. His biggest concern for everyone during aerobics is safety. It ultimately boils down to having someone on site that is qualified to perform the duties necessary.

Regarding the State regulations for a Class A pool, someone with a Pool Operator Certificate must be present and further investigation conducted with our Insurance Company noted that anyone holding that certification meets the requirement. That individual does not have to be employed as staff. We can plan ahead for next year.

The Pool Board meets in March and will include the Sr. Center Board to discuss cost and extension of the season.

Keib commented regarding the cleaning, she was told there might have been a pipe backup that caused some of the problems. She was raised to leave things better than you found them. She swept out the office area, cleaned under benches, sprayed down bathrooms and made sure everything was clean.

Regarding the Pool Operator Certification. She did go on her own to get the Pool Operator Cert. She spoke with Jeanne about it and asked if the city would reimburse her. If they were willing to and they needed a Pool Op she would be willing to get it and not ask for a wage. As far as being reimbursed and paid to be down there – no she wasn't. Did the city pay for her pool operator certificate – yes, they did. Pool costs did go up due to an increase in lifeguard wages. Prices have gone up over the years. Keib is still willing to be a Pool Operator at no cost to the city.

Consider hiring full-time maintenance employee and setting wage. Gary TeSelle recommended hiring Tanner Paap at \$17.50 per hour with a .50 increase per certification. A motion was made by DeLong and seconded by Roth to approve hiring Tanner Paap as a full-time maintenance employee at \$17.50 per hour with a .50 increase per certification pending background check and pre-employment drug screening. Discussion: Mayor Kelley questioned if he had any certifications thru his previous employer? An evaluation can be conducted after 6 months. Roll call vote: DeLong yes, Roth yes, Freeman yes, Keib yes. Motion carried.

SCCDP Annual Report: <u>Jonathan Jank</u> with SCCDP thanked the Council for their financial investment and time towards the organization. He also thanked Mayor Kelley personally for serving as the Vice Chair on the Board of Directors. Jonathan briefly reviewed the Public Sector funding Agreement. Milford's annual investment was \$12,200.00 which was spent toward the operations of SCCDP according to NE Statute. The public funds are segregated in a separate bank account. The funds have only been used for the purpose of Economic Development. In 2022 the SCCDP completed an annual private sector fundraising membership drive and conducted job performance evaluations of the present CEO. Annual audits have been conducted within 60 days of June 30, 2023, meeting compliance of this agreement. Jonathan would like the city to consider renewing support for Economic Development of the new Funding and Membership Agreements. He shared a quote from Evan Clark with Hoppe Development. Document attached.

Board Chair Matt Howe expressed his gratitude of being a Board member. One of the biggest things he has seen with the organization is the building of a very strong team throughout the county which supports all the efforts. He greatly appreciates the support of Milford in the past and continued support. He has seen the fruits of these efforts through Workforce Housing, Childcare, Workforce Development. Jonathan's team is always setting the bar higher, recently SCCDP became one of 6 accredited Chambers in the State of NE. Each community has their own strengths which make Seward County Strong.

<u>Jonathan</u> noted the funding request last year increased 3% and they are asking again this year for a 3% increase. They are operating on a budget deficit. The total funding request for Milford is \$12,566.00.

<u>Councilmember Freeman</u> stated, she appreciates all the hard work that SCCDP does for Milford and the County.

Mayor Kelley noted it would be hard pressed to find another county working as hard as Seward County. Jonathan and his team provide amazing opportunities to improve all of Seward County. They bring ideas, opportunities, and the companies they engage to explore Seward County are amazing. Thank you!

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Supported Beck's Hybrids expansion project by Goehner through TIF application (\$20,200,000 investment and 30 jobs to be created); gained approval from Seward County Commissioners to pursue submitting Nebraska Department of Transportation Economic Opportunity Program application to support paving county road next to Beck's site with 75% grant of \$84,397.12.

FUNDING AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this $5^{+/1}$ day of September 2023, by and between the CITY OF MILFORD, NEBRASKA, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the CITY, and the SEWARD COUNTY CHAMBER & DEVELOPMENT PARTNERSHIP, a Nebraska nonprofit corporation, hereinafter referred to as the SCCDP.

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into a mutually beneficial Funding Agreement for the purpose of promoting economic development in the City of MILFORD, Nebraska, and throughout Seward County, Nebraska.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals and the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. The City and the SCCDP agree to enter into this Funding Agreement for the promotion of economic development as set forth above on the basis of the City's fiscal year which commences October 1, 2023 and ends September 30, 2024.
- 2. The City agrees to fund the promotion of economic development by paying to the SCCDP the sum of TWELVE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SIX and No/100ths Dollars (\$12,566.00) subject to the following requirements:
 - (i) The SCCDP shall place all funds received pursuant to this Agreement in a separate segregated economic development fund ("the Public Economic Development Fund"); and
 - (ii) The SCCDP shall use all funds received pursuant to this Agreement only for the purpose of "encouraging immigration, new industries, and investment and to conduct and carry on a publicity campaign, . . . and advertising the various agricultural, horticultural, manufacturing, commercial, and other resources, including utility services of the City," all in accordance with **Neb. Rev. Stat.** § 13-315 (Reissue 2012), a copy of which is attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "A"; and
 - (iii) The SCCDP shall have in place private sector fundraising and shall in good faith use all best efforts to have completed an annual membership drive by December 31, 2023; and
 - (iv) The SCCDP shall have conducted a job performance evaluation of the SCCDP President & CEO on or before December 31, 2023; and
- 3. As a way of ensuring the City's funds will be used in compliance with **Neb. Rev. Stat.** § 13-315, a designee of the City and a designee of the SCCDP shall reconcile and audit the Public Economic Development Fund annually. The fiscal year end reconciliation and audit shall be completed within sixty (60) days of June 30, 2024. If there are funds remaining in the Public Economic Development Fund at fiscal year end, the funds for any authorized expenditures which accrued during

the fiscal year, but which have not yet been paid for, may be retained by the SCCDP to pay the same. Any funds remaining after accounting for the authorized accrued expenses as provided herein shall be retained by SCCDP and considered as part of the City's next fiscal year appropriation should one be made by the City for the SCCDP.

4. At the expiration date of this Funding Agreement on September 30, 2024, the parties hereto shall either enter into a new Agreement for the ensuing fiscal year or this Agreement shall terminate and the end of year reconciliation and audit shall be accomplished as provided for in Paragraph 3 above.

PUBLIC MEMBERSHIP AGREEMENT OF SEWARD COUNTY CHAMBER & DEVELOPMENT PARTNERSHIP

Whereas in accordance with the Bylaws of SEWARD COUNTY CHAMBER & DEVELOPMENT PARTNERSHIP (the "Partnership"), the terms of membership for the City of Seward of Seward, Nebraska ("Seward"), the County of Seward, Nebraska, (the "County") the City of Milford, Nebraska ("Milford") and the Village of Utica, Nebraska ("Utica"), are to be set forth in a Membership Agreement; and

Whereas, the Board of Directors of the Partnership has established the terms of membership for Public (Anchor) Members and desires that they be set forth in a Membership Agreement with each such Member;

NOW THEREFORE, the Partnership and the undersigned agree as follows:

- 1. In accordance with the terms of a Funding Agreement between Seward and the Partnership, Seward will make a financial contribution of \$73,760 to the Partnership for the fiscal year running from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024. As a result of such payment, Seward shall be an Anchor Member in good standing of the Partnership with the rights and obligations provided herein and in the Bylaws, including specifically, the right to name one (1) Director as set forth in the Bylaws.
- 2. In accordance with the terms of a Funding Agreement between the County and the Partnership, the County will make a financial contribution of \$60,100 to the Partnership for the fiscal year running from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. As a result of such payment, the County shall be an Anchor Member in good standing of the Partnership with the rights and obligations provided herein and in the Bylaws, including specifically, the right to name one (1) Director as set forth in the Bylaws.
- 3. In accordance with the terms of a Funding Agreement between Milford and the Partnership, Milford will make a financial contribution of \$12,566 to the Partnership for the fiscal year running from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024. As a result of such payment, Milford shall be an Anchor Member in good standing of the Partnership with the rights and obligations provided herein and in the Bylaws, including specifically, the right to name one (1) Director as set forth in the Bylaws.
- 4. In accordance with the terms of a Funding Agreement between Utica and the Partnership, Utica will make a financial contribution of \$6,556 to the Partnership for the fiscal year running from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024. As a result of such payment, Utica shall be an Anchor Member in good standing of the Partnership with the rights and obligations provided herein and in the Bylaws, including specifically, the right to name one (1) Director as set forth in the Bylaws.
- 5. For so long as the Public entities listed above are Members in good standing of the Partnership, each such entity shall be entitled to vote on all matters raised at meetings of the Members of the Partnership. Each Public entity shall designate a person to represent that Public entity at meetings of the Members and shall vote on behalf of the Public entity at each meeting of the Members.
- 6. The term of this Membership Agreement shall begin at the start of each Public Member's fiscal year in 2023 and terminate at the end of their fiscal year in 2024, provided, however, that each year, the parties will negotiate in good faith for the renewal of this Agreement (as a combined Agreement or as separate agreements with Seward, Milford, Utica, and the County) for an additional term upon such terms as the parties shall then agree.

ORDINANCE NO. 973

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MILFORD, NEBRASKA AMENDING THE CITY OF MILFORD ZONING MAP TO PROVIDE FOR A CHANGE OF ZONE FROM R1 TO MIXED USE CORRIDOR OVERLAY DISTRICT FOR A PARCEL GENERALLY LOCATED IN THE NORTHEAST QUARTER (NE1/4) OF SECTION ELEVEN (11), TOWNSHIP NINE (9) NORTH, RANGE THREE (3) EAST OF THE SIXTH P.M., SEWARD, COUNTY, NEBRASKA, AS MORE PARTICUARLY DESCRIBED HEREIN.

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Milford Zoning Regulations is to promote the health and general welfare of the community, to lessen congestion in streets, to secure safety from fire and other dangers; to provide adequate light and air; to promote the distribution of population, land classifications, and land development to support provisions for adequate transportation, water flows, water supply, drainage, sanitation, recreation, and other public requirements; to protect property against blight and depreciation; and to secure economy in governmental expenditures;

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 19-904 provides that the legislative body of cities of the second class shall provide for the manner in which building zones, regulations, and district boundaries shall be determined, established, and enforced, and from time to time amended, supplemented, or changed;

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 19-904 provides that the City Council shall provide for the manner in which zoning regulations and district boundaries shall be determined, established, and enforced, and from time to time amended, supplemented, or changed; provided, however, that such amendments shall not become effective until after separate public hearings by the Planning Commission and City Council, public notice of which shall have been published in a newspaper of general circulation at least one (1) time, ten (10) days prior to such hearing;

WHEREAS, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 19-915 provides that zoning district boundaries defined with reference to a zoning map may be changed, modified, or terminated, by an appropriate amendatory action which describes the changed, modified, terminated, or created zone or districts or part thereof by legal description or metes and bounds, and without republishing the original zoning map as a part of the amendatory action and without setting forth and repealing the entire section or ordinance adopting the rezoning maps, or a part of the zoning map, as a part of the amendatory action;

WHEREAS, the requirements for amendment of district boundaries have been fulfilled;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MILFORD, SEWARD COUNTY, NEBRASKA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That the official zoning map of the City of Milford, Nebraska, be amended to change the following described parcel from zone R1 Low Density Residential District to zone MUC Mixed Use Corridor Overlay District:

Part of the Northeast Quarter (NE½) of Section Eleven (11), Township Nine (9) North, Range Three (3) East of the Sixth P.M., Seward County, Nebraska, being described as follows: Beginning at the Northeast Corner of Tax Lot 54, as platted in said Northeast Quarter, thence S00°00'00"W (assumed bearing) on the East Line of said Tax Lot 54, a distance of 139.66 feet to the Southeast Corner of said Tax Lot 54; thence continuing S00°00'00"W, a distance of 214.99 feet to a point on the easterly extension of the centerline of the alley between Tax Lots 65 and 66; thence S89°15'08"E on said easterly extension, a distance of 216.00 feet; thence N00°00'00"E parallel with the East Line of said Tax Lot 54, a distance of 354.24 feet to a point on the North Line of a parcel of land previously described by Deed Book 83, page 23, thence N89°08'36"W on said North Line, a distance of 216.00 feet to the point of beginning, containing 1.76 acres, more or less.

A map of the zone change is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as **Exhibit A**.

Section 2: That all ordinances, resolutions and Code sections or portions thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of this amendment.

Section 3: That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law and shall be published in pamphlet form.



ORDINANCE NO. 974

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MILFORD, NEBRASKA, AMENDING MILFORD MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 10-117 TO MODIFY THE STARTING TIME AT WHICH BEER CAN BE SOLD WITHIN CITY LIMITS ON SUNDAYS.

WHEREAS, Milford Municipal Code § 10-117 sets forth certain requirements related to the days and times during which alcoholic liquor, beer, and wine can be sold within the municipal limits of the City of Milford, Nebraska (the "City") for both on and off premises consumption; and

WHEREAS, the City finds it expedient and in the best interest of the City to amend portions of Code § 10-117 to change the starting time on Sundays at which beer can be sold within the City limits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MILFORD, SEWARD COUNTY, NEBRASKA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Milford Municipal Code § 10-117 shall be repealed in its entirety and replaced with the following in lieu thereof:

§ 10-117 ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES; HOURS OF SALE.

It shall be unlawful for any licensed person or persons or their agents to sell any alcoholic beverages within the Municipality except during the hours provided herein:

No person or persons shall consume any alcoholic beverages on licensed premises for a period of time longer than fifteen (15) minutes after the time fixed herein for stopping the sale of alcoholic beverages on the said premises.

Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit licensed premises from being open for other business on days and hours during which the sale or dispensing of alcoholic beverages is prohibited by this section.

Section 2: That all Ordinances and Code provisions or portions thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to that extent.

Section 3: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after publication as required by law and shall be published in pamphlet form.
